Let's talk about why some people enjoy playing games like football

Talking Points

- What do you enjoy most about playing games?
- Is football a game you enjoy? Why / why not?
- Would you rather play in the World Cup or play a game with your friends? Why?

Activities

- You don't need a whole football team to play games with a football! Ask some of the older people in your family about the games they used to play, and have a go at them with your friends.
- Can you make up a game with a football? It could involve trying to get the ball close to a target, or kicking the ball against a wall. What rules will you need and why do you need them?

Let's talk about diving and fair play

'Diving' in football means pretending that you have been tripped up so that you win a free kick or a penalty. In this amusing film, the well-known F2 Freestylers demonstrate the 'art' of diving in football.

Talking Points

- Some people say that 'diving' in a football match is clever play. What do you think?
- Would you rather win a game knowing that you cheated, or lose a game knowing that you played fairly?
- What if the game is a really important one, with lots of supporters hoping that their team wins?

Activity

The rules of football are not fixed – they change from time to time. Think of a rule that it might be fun to do without, or think of a new rule that it might be fun to introduce. Play a game with your changed rules: were the changes for the better or for the worse? Why do we need rules anyway?

Talking Points

- "There's no need for Bury supporters to be upset they can simply support another team." Do you agree or disagree, and why?
- Is a club like Bury an important part of a community? What might people have missed when it was gone?

Activity

- o Interview members of your family about a football club (or another organisation) that means something to them. When did they first go to a game (or event) and what was it like? What are their best and worst memories? How would they feel if the club (or organisation) disappeared?
- Why not record the interviews to keep?
