



Learning about the different sorts of homes that animals have.

Talking Points

- Would you feel safe living in trees, like monkeys?
- Do you think monkeys or lions would feel at home in your house?
- Could lots of humans live in one home, like ants?
- Do you think farm animals would rather live in wild places than in homes built by humans?

Activities

- Make up a conversation about homes between birds, horses and bees.
- Build a special home for your doll or your pet.

Animal Homes by Living Classroom

Why do animals make homes? How do they do it? Can you find some animal homes yourself?

Vocabulary: A predator is an animal that hunts and eats other animals.

Talking Points

- Did you think of humans as animals? What is it about humans that makes us different from other animals?
- Can you remember the four reasons given why animals need homes? Can you sign them? Are some more important to you than others?
- What is 'comfort' and how important is it?

Activities

- Try an animal home scavenger hunt of your own. (Remember the three essential things!)
- Another essential thing was to 'slow down'.
 Why is this good advice for scavenging?

Talking Points
